#### **Creating Healing Environments**

Good Samaritan Hospital's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) received funding for 14 new cardiorespiratory monitors. With the GE B450 monitors, NICU team members can easily remove the patient data module that holds all the infants' data and move it to another area within the department, allowing team members to move the baby to another bed space without moving the whole cardiorespiratory monitor.
