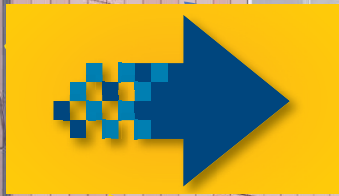

A Farewell to Good Samaritan: A 37-Year Adventure



As I prepare to retire from my role as President and CEO of the Good Samaritan Foundation at the end of December, I reflect on a 37-year adventure that has been deeply meaningful.

I joined Good Samaritan Hospital in 1987 as Director of Volunteer Services, where I worked alongside the Good Samaritan Hospital Guild. By 1989, I had transitioned into the Foundation, leading planned giving, where I launched the Legacy Society to ensure our Foundation's future and helped coordinate the annual Gala. A quick six years later, in 1995, I took on leadership of the Foundation during the Emergency Unit Campaign, a pivotal \$2 million effort that set the stage for future successes.

Over the years, our fundraising campaigns—including the NICU Campaign with Jay Hayden (1998), the Compassionate Care Multiplied Campaign with Bob Castellini (2006), and *Forever Forward* with Kip Heekin (2024)—demonstrated the strength of our community and philanthropy.

Key milestones of this adventure of mine include securing complete funding to open the Free Health Center in 2011, securing the first million-dollar estate gift from Miss McDevitt's Estate, a first million-dollar gift from The Hatton Foundation, and introducing the first da Vinci robotic surgical system to Greater Cincinnati, which was made possible by philanthropic support and reflected our commitment to medical innovation.

More than the campaigns, it is the people I will miss most—our donors, Foundation volunteers (of which are too many to name, but include The Good Samaritans and Guild), dedicated Board of Trustees, and Good Sam partners, whose support and leadership have been the backbone of our success. I am also deeply grateful to our dedicated team members, past and present, whom I have witnessed grow both professionally and personally. Leadership, to me, has always been about enhancing others and ensuring a lasting impact. As I look back, I am humbled by the privilege of working with such extraordinary individuals and being part of an organization dedicated to transforming healthcare.

Transitioning out of this role is bittersweet. The connections and impact made over these years will always be cherished, but I am looking forward to the special time to come spent with my family and loved ones.

Thank you for your trust and support. It has been an honor to serve, and I am confident Good Samaritan Foundation will continue to thrive.

Under her leadership, Mary's teams have raised more than \$92 million to benefit Good Samaritan Hospital, Good Samaritan College of Nursing and Health Science, Good Samaritan Free Health Center, and other TriHealth entities. Additionally, the Foundation's assets have grown tremendously, from \$7.1 million in 2001 to more than \$102 million today! A few, of many, significant Foundation accomplishments during Mary's tenure include:

- Renovating multiple areas of Good Samaritan Hospital through capital campaign funding, including Good Sam's Emergency Department, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU), Cardiovascular ICU, the Radiation Oncology and Infusion Center, and the new state-of-the-art ambulatory center.
- Raising \$9.5 million during 2006's Compassionate Care Multiplied Campaign to benefit Cardiac Services, Good Samaritan College, Medical Education and Research, and Parish Nurse Ministry.
- Securing funding to acquire Greater Cincinnati's first da Vinci robotic surgical system.
- Funding and establishing Good Sam's Medical Education Center, Employee Fitness Center, and the Good Samaritan Free Health Center, which is fully funded by philanthropic dollars.

And, most recently, wrapping up *Forever Forward*, committing \$30 million in funding for the new state-of-the-art ambulatory center.

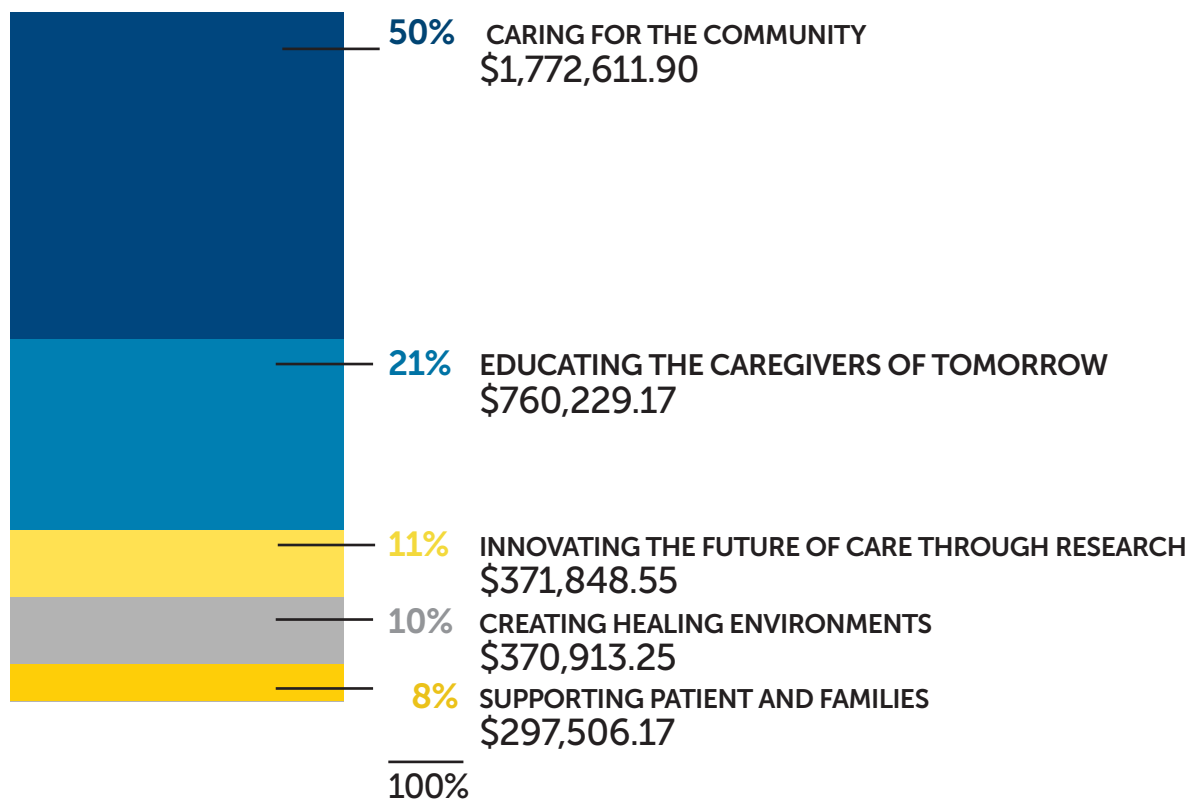

The Journey Through Forever *Forward*: A Vision Realized at Good Samaritan Hospital

In a time when healthcare is evolving rapidly with new therapies and treatments, the Forever *Forward* initiative stands as a powerful testament to our unwavering commitment to compassionate care and community health. Launched by the Good Samaritan Foundation officially in the fall of 2022, this \$30 million fundraising initiative is not just about constructing a new world-class facility but about reshaping the future of Good Samaritan Hospital to meet the needs of our community with equity and excellence.

The journey began as a vision in the fall of 2019, with ambitious plans for a transformation of Good Sam's Clifton campus. However, the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic introduced significant delays. Despite these challenges, the Forever *Forward* Committee's resilience and unwavering dedication have kept the vision alive, reflecting our core belief in compassionate care for all.

October 2022 marked a pivotal milestone with the groundbreaking of the transformation, the key component of the \$240 million Master Facility Plan that would house Good Sam's main areas of care. This five-story, 168,000-square-foot structure will be home to a new Emergency Department, enhanced Advanced Surgical Institute and Neurosciences, the TriHealth Cancer and Blood Institute, and expanded Women's Services, including the Breast Center, the TriHealth Heart and Vascular Institute, and Diagnostic Imaging. The new ambulatory center is set to revolutionize healthcare delivery, offering innovative new technologies and care services, improved wayfinding, and a comprehensive patient experience.

The Forever *Forward* initiative is driven by a deep commitment to addressing health disparities in Hamilton County and beyond. With life expectancy varying by up to 20 years between neighboring communities, it is clear that innovative models of care and proactive partnerships are essential. By investing in cutting-edge infrastructure and expanding access to high-quality care, we aim to bridge this gap and ensure that all individuals receive the care they deserve.

A significant part of this transformative journey has been supported by record-breaking fundraising efforts through The Good Samaritans' Galas.

The "All That Glitters" Gala in 2023 and "Artrageous" Gala in 2024 not only surpassed expectations but also played a crucial role in funding this ambitious project.

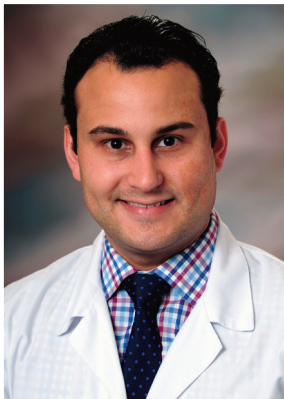

Good Samaritan Hospital Guild Awards More Than \$230,000

For the entire fiscal year, more than \$230,000 has been or will be distributed to various locations throughout the Good Samaritan Region! Scan the code on this page to see a full list of recipients.

One specific area of funding was Good Samaritan's Perinatal Programs. The program received funding for 1,000 diabetes educational manuals in the fall. This manual is titled "Your Journey to Diabetes Wellness During Pregnancy" and was developed by a TriHealth nurse and dietitian. This is a diabetes education teaching manual that the nurse and dietitian use during their instruction with the patient. The patient can then take this manual with her for future reference.

"Many thanks to the Good Samaritan Foundation for the generous funding for our diabetes manuals called 'Your Journey to Diabetes Wellness During Pregnancy,'" said Julie Wanstrath, MEd, RD, LD, CDCES, Registered Dietitian/Diabetes Educator, Perinatal Programs. "These manuals are an essential part of our teaching sessions with our pregnant women with diabetes. Treatment includes lifestyle changes, such as eating a healthy diet, carbohydrate counting, checking blood sugars, a walking plan, and when needed, medication to control blood sugars. These changes can help toward a positive pregnancy outcome."

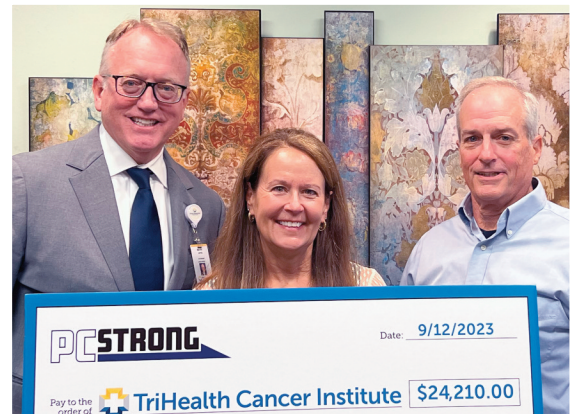


Team Unicorn Bowling Fundraiser

He's one-of-two people served at TriHealth Cancer and Blood Institute with a rare strand, therefore self-proclaiming himself as a "unicorn." Following treatment, he's doing well and feels blessed by those at TCBI and wants to pass along blessings to others. He and his wife started a bowling fundraiser benefitting the TriHealth Center and Blood Institute Patient Assistance Fund, in care of Good Samaritan Foundation. This fund helps underserved patients battling cancer who need help with transportation, food, or assistance with bills, such as electric, rent, etc.

The 2nd Annual PC Strong Golf Outing

The PC Strong Fund provides financial resources to cancer patients in need during the course of their treatments. Paul Caito founded the PC Strong Fund after going through pancreatic cancer treatments and surgery at TriHealth Cancer and Blood Institute. Physician and Team Member Honor and Memorial Walls Gain Traction as Way to Recognize Individuals Who Have Impacted Good Samaritan

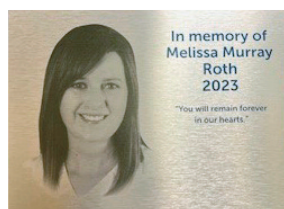
In the fall of 2022, a Physician Honor & Memorial Wall was installed in the Medical Education Department on the third floor at Good Samaritan Hospital. A year later, a new Team Member Honor & Memorial Wall was positioned in the Good Samaritan Hospital cafeteria on the fifth floor.

Since their inception, 15 plaques of current and past physicians have been included on the Physician Wall (with eight more on the way!), and eight plaques of current and past team members have been included on the Team Member Wall.

With a gift of \$500, a plaque can be added to the Physician or Team Member Honor & Memorial Wall recognizing a Good Sam physician, team member, or volunteer.

"The Physician Memorial Wall recognizes the legacies of those who have set the standards of excellence for our patients in our community and our profession. Recently we honored the enduring impact of Dr. Rae Hartman, a trailblazing Family Medicine Physician at Good Samaritan Hospital. Dr. Hartman was the first female physician to graduate from St. Ursula Academy here in Cincinnati and was just one of six women in her medical school class of 97 students. Even after several decades of full-time practice, she continued to learn and pursue education at Good Samaritan Hospital by coming to Grand Rounds with our new residents in training. We learn from those to come before us, paving new paths and setting examples of professionalism. In this spirit, we can continue to recognize our shared history and those who have raised the bar and made that ever-enduring difference to our patients and our profession."

Why did you choose GSC?

I chose GSC because the College being in the hospital offers unique clinical experiences, the tuition discount for employees, and course schedules allow me to set my own pace for graduation. I also have family members who attended GSC.

After obtaining your degree, what are your plans?

After graduation, I plan to continue working for Good Samaritan Hospital in the operating room for two years before I am eligible to pursue a Registered Nurse First Assistant (RNFA) certification.

Has receiving scholarships helped alleviate any financial burden?

Scholarships have helped to ease some of the financial burden I would have otherwise experienced. Before GSC, I was working full-time in a different career. Once I decided to leave that field and pursue nursing, I was worried about making ends meet while attending school full-time. These scholarships along with other grants have cleared a path that has enabled me to further my education without the constant financial stress.

What would have been different had you not received the scholarships?

If I didn't receive the scholarships, I wouldn't be on the path to graduation I am currently on. I would have taken fewer classes each semester. I am extremely grateful for the scholarships awarded. Once I complete my educational goals, I would like to become a donor in the future.

What led you to study at GSC?

My relationship with Good Samaritan Hospital spans nearly two decades, marked by profound personal experiences. In 2007, while pursuing my first bachelor’s degree at Northern Kentucky University, my 48-year-old father, Bob Conroy, suffered a massive stroke that required his admission to the Neuro Intensive Care Unit. I spent 50 consecutive days by his side as he recovered from a craniotomy. Later that year, he contracted a severe strep infection, necessitating an aortic valve replacement. These trials exposed me to the intricate workings of nursing care at Good Samaritan, deepening my appreciation for their exceptional team.

In 2021, my world was once again upended when my father was diagnosed with Stage 3 bile duct cancer, which rapidly progressed to Stage 4. I returned to Good Samaritan, spending countless days and weeks supporting him through his battle. His final months were spent on the Telemetry Unit of the 11th floor, where I now work. Being part of the team that once cared for my father has been incredibly rewarding, and I often feel as though fate guided me back here.

On June 13, 2021, we lost my father to a heart attack. Despite his passing, I am deeply grateful for the 14 extra years we had with him, thanks to the life-saving efforts and compassionate care provided by the staff at Good Samaritan Hospital. Their dedication has profoundly impacted my life, and I am forever thankful for their role in our family’s journey.

How has scholarship assistance benefited you personally and your academic journey?

The scholarships I received while pursuing my bachelor’s degree were a game changer for our young family. With three children at home, we needed all the support we could get to turn our dreams into reality. Thanks to these scholarships, I was able to focus on my studies with peace of mind, knowing that we weren’t alone. It reaffirmed that others care deeply and are committed to helping good people achieve their aspirations. This truly embodies the spirit of a “Good Samaritan.”

What would have been different if you wouldn’t have received the scholarships?

This scholarship profoundly transformed my educational journey. It enabled me to take an internship on the oncology floor rather than working part-time, a critical support given my responsibilities as a parent of three. By easing a substantial financial burden, the scholarship made nursing school an incredibly positive and transformative experience. I am deeply grateful to the donors, who are true “dream makers.” Their selfless and life-changing contribution has profoundly impacted my future, and I am humbled by their generosity.

Is there anything you’d like to share with your scholarship donors?

You are truly the change makers in my life. Your contribution to my education is something I will forever be grateful for, and I hope to pay it forward to others in the future. The legacy you are creating and the support you provide to students in making challenging goals more achievable will have a lasting impact for years to come. I am deeply impressed by your generosity, and I hope you know that your contribution is vital in sustaining the future of healthcare.
