For over 170 years, Good Samaritan Hospital has served Greater Cincinnati with the same compassionate care once displayed by our founding Sisters of Charity. This tradition of care can be traced all the way back to our establishment in 1852 as the Sisters rose to meet the evolving healthcare demands within our community through innovation rooted in a faith-based mission.

Though as years pass, what was once state-of-the-art must become state-of-the-art once again in order to adapt to the challenges of tomorrow. To meet these challenges, we are launching Forever Forward, which I'm excited for you to learn more about in this edition of Compassionate Giving. 

## **Areas of Impact**



#### Caring for the Community

Alongside a small, core staff, **Good Samaritan Free Health Center** volunteers served nearly 6,000 hours during approximately 9,000 patient visits for an estimated value of \$2.9 donated to the community. In the fall, \$1 million was gifted by the Ruthman family to the FHC to ensure uninsured adults in Hamilton County continue to receive the medical care they need to enjoy a higher quality of life.





#### **Educating the Caregivers of Tomorrow**

At **Good Samaritan College of Nursing and Health Science,** a record \$368,050 was awarded, providing 108 scholarships to 66 students for the 2022/2023 academic year.





#### Innovating the Future of Care through Research

Support of the **Minimally Invasive Training Center** continued to provide physicians, residents, and nurses with essential, hands-on, expert instruction to continue their education through impactful teaching and learning experiences.





#### **Creating Healing Environments**

New stretchers and mattresses for the **Emergency Department** and a mechanical chest compression device enhanced the care patients receive during situations when timing is often critical.





#### **Supporting Patients and Families**

The **Neonatal Intensive Care Unit** was generously gifted funds for 15 additional kangaroo chairs, ensuring each bedside in the NICU has a comfortable rocker-recliner chair, along with new baby clothing and bedding.




## WELCOME NEW TRUSTEES

# FOREVER Forward

For over 170 years, our community has sought out its Good Samaritans. Whether traveling from around the corner or across the state line, they come seeking compassionate care, knowing they'll be welcomed, loved, and treated with dignity regardless of race or religion because that's just what Good Samaritans do. This tradition dates back to 1852 when the Sisters of Charity founded what became known as the Good Samaritan Hospital. Over the years, we've adapted to the changing world. Through expansions or evolution, we have remained a lifeline to the community. But the future demands more than ever.

Today, our campus encompasses more than an entire city block. During and after the pandemic, Good Sam remains our community's lifeline. However, healthcare moves at a fiery pace. It is no longer feasible or cost-effective to renovate. It's time to rethink. What was once state-of-the-art must become state-of-the-art again in order to adapt to the challenges of tomorrow, starting at the core: a new center. This new center will be home to expanded Cancer and Advanced Surgical Institutes, a relocation of the emergency department, reimagined women's services, cardiac services, and centralized diagnostics.



This fall, Good Samaritan Foundation will publicly launch Forever *Forward* – the largest comprehensive fundraising effort in the hospital's history. "In the past, our fundraising campaigns were critical, but Forever *Forward* is transformative to the

overall campus," said Mary Rafferty, Good Samaritan Foundation President and Chief Executive Officer. "Good Sam hasn't seen a transformation this large that touches so many of our core areas since the '80s, which was the first capital campaign ever in our history. The Foundation was incorporated right after this happened."



"This is an exciting time as we fund a new state-of-the-art building designed to deliver the latest advancements in healthcare technology and treatments to our community," said Kip Heekin, Good Samaritan Foundation Board Member and Forever *Forward* Steering Committee

Chair. "Not only will this campaign help improve our patient experience, but it will also help us continue to attract the best and brightest doctors and nurses to deliver our compassionate care."

We have an obligation to care for the next generation, as we've done for 170 years. Large-scale change is necessary and it's urgent in order to do that. Philanthropy can accelerate and enhance this project in a way that operational dollars alone cannot.

"Forever Forward is about access for all to receive great health care," added Mary. "Good Sam has been a lifeline to our community. It's critical for our legacy that the Good Samaritan Foundation ensures that Good Samaritan Hospital can grow and provide compassionate care for our future generations in Greater Cincinnati."

The new center is a \$240 million investment, with the Foundation committing \$30 million through the Forever *Forward* effort. Through philanthropic dollars, key program areas will be enhanced and expanded to be able to better meet the needs of the evolving community.

"Forever Forward is a substantial investment in continuing to deliver critical programs and advanced treatments in the heart of our community," added Kip. "This program continues TriHealth's commitment to providing access to safe, cost-effective, and high-quality care in a convenient setting for our patients."

## Through this project, core areas of Good Sam will be able to provide enhanced access, innovative technology, and a more personalized patient experience.

## Your Philanthropy Update

## Update on Laura Broxterman

Laura was featured as the focus for the spring 2022 edition of Compassionate Giving. Laura shared her story of resiliency and gratitude, battling cancer twice alongside Dr. Girnius and his team at TriHealth's Cancer Institute at Good Samaritan. She was also the 2022 Patient Champion for last year's 37th Annual Gala, "Dancing Through the Decades." The sold-out event raised a record-breaking \$618,000, supporting the Cellular Therapy program in the Cancer Institute at Good Samaritan, along with the annual support of the Good Samaritan Free Health Center and Medical Education Research Fund.

Since my story first appeared in the spring 2022 edition of the GSF Compassionate Giving Magazine I successfully completed an autologous stem cell transplant for Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma. This procedure is part of Good Samaritan Hospital's cellular therapy program and is available to those with relapsing blood cancers. The entire transplant procedure was done on an outpatient basis with every step explained in detail by Dr. Girnius and his

transplant team. The transplant process is very involved—bloodwork, echocardiogram, EKG, and pulmonary functions tests prior to transplant. Days of growth factor injections to maximize the amount of stem cells produced in the body. Hoxworth Blood Center performs an apheresis procedure which takes several hours to collect the stem cells from the blood that are then frozen and stored. Next, I had to go through six days of intense chemotherapy to wipe out my immune system. On the seventh day, I received my stem cells via IV infusion. This process involved daily visits to the Good Sam infusion center for the first 4-6 weeks to check labs and get fluids, blood products, or any electrolytes that I may need. I experienced a few bumps in the road—hospitalized for eight days with neutropenic fever and a small bowel obstruction (all due to my immunocompromised state—

which is very common with these transplants). The care I received both outpatient and inpatient from the nursing staff, oncology team, internal medicine, infectious disease, gastroenterology, and surgery team was top notch at Good Samaritan Hospital. I felt supported, valued, and cared for by all the attentive doctors and nursing staff. As I write this, over 90 days have passed since my transplant and I am feeling really good. I am hoping to return to work as a Family Practice Nurse Practitioner mid-September. I am so fortunate to have received a stem cell transplant and hope for a long remission.

During the Good Samaritan Hospital Guild spring disbursements, one specific area awarded was the Rehabilitation Department, which sought funding for an aView Advanced Monitor and PatCom FEES Workstation. A Functional Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES) is the gold standard for swallow function assessment.

Populations served at Good Samaritan by Rehab who will benefit from this equipment include inpatients and outpatients with brain injury and stroke, head and neck cancer, progressive neurological diseases (Parkinson's, ALS), and post-intubation care (including post-covid patients).

For a speech-language pathologist (SLP) that specializes in voice, swallowing, and head/neck cancer, this test gives me a lot of information about how a patient's throat functions, the integrity of their vocal cords and airway, and how safely they can eat and drink," said Lauren Burke, CCC-SLP, Good Sam Speech-Language Pathologist. "Using the information that we receive from a FEES for both inpatient and outpatient populations, an SLP can make the safest and most appropriate diet recommendation for our patients. Safe and appropriate diet recommendations statistically decrease hospital readmissions and medical costs related to feeding tubes, and they can also significantly improve a patient's quality of life. Because of this type of swallow exam, some of our patients have been able to return to eating and drinking normal foods and liquids after months or years of using a feeding tube following a stroke, surgery, or cancer treatment."

## **Pursuing It with Everything She Has:**

# Jane Whalen's Dedication to Good Sam and the Future of Nursing



In 1979, Jane Whalen stepped into the nursing profession as one of the newest graduates of what was then called the Good Samaritan Hospital School of Nursing. Alongside her peers and some of her closest friends, little did Jane know that graduating with her diploma would not only propel her into an amazing career spanning 45 years at Good Samaritan Hospital and TriHealth, but also a life of philanthropic leadership. A recent retiree, Jane continues to find ways to ensure her passion for nursing and education lives on in students today through the Jane Hartman Whalen Scholarship and the Class of 1979 Scholarship.

t the age of 18, Jane, a Cincinnati native born at Good Sam, embarked on her nursing classes at the School of Nursing in 1976. "I'm so grateful for that opportunity," Jane says, reflecting on her time as a student at Good Sam. "I actually had two of my high school classmates who were in school with me. It was a really good experience, but also frightening and difficult. The classes were challenging, but we quickly made friends, bonded together, and found that we could help each other. We could study together. We could encourage each other! And sometimes, we would cry together when things were really tough."

Though classes were challenging for Jane, she graduated from the program with honors, receiving the First Scholastic Award, and a job in one of Good Samaritan Hospital's Medical Units (West 100). For four years directly following school, Jane provided care of adult inpatients within the unit and served as a preceptor for newly hired staff nurses. This experience launched Jane into the Medical-Surgical Intensive Care Unit from 1983 through 1988. Jane continued her education, studying for her Bachelor's in Nursing (BSN). But Jane didn't stop there. In 30 years following the completion of her BSN, she went on to obtain her Master's in Nursing (MSN) and finally her Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP).

Today, Jane has not only proven successful in the educational realm but also in her career. This past June, Jane retired from an impressive career of service in health care. "As a 1979 graduate, I am proud of my affiliation with Good Samaritan College, and I am really proud of the last 45 years that I've spent working at Good Sam and TriHealth."

Beyond her work in Good Sam's Medical Unit and Medical-Surgical ICU, Jane has served in the roles of Continuing Education Instructor, Clinical Nurse Specialist for Critical Care, and until June 2022, Clinical Nurse Specialist for Cardiac Surgery.

It was during her time in Cardiac Surgery that her affiliation with the College truly came full circle.

"In 2009, as I had been working with the cardiac surgery program, the surgeons that I was working alongside wanted to honor my 30 years in nursing. They made a one-time donation to the Good Samaritan Foundation in my honor to be used as a scholarship for a student in the College of Nursing. I was honored! That summer, I went to the scholarship reception and it was so much fun to meet the student who received my scholarship. A week following the reception, I called the Foundation and said, 'How can I do this again? What would it take to do this in the future?"

From that one-time gift followed by a conversation with the Foundation, Jane set up a scholarship endowment – the Jane Hartman Whalen Scholarship. With her newfound dedication to philanthropy for the College, Jane set out on a new mission – to encourage today's students in the same boat she was once in during her time in the School of Nursing. Jane's vision for scholarship support for current students spanned beyond only the Jane Hartman Whalen Scholarship, though.

"Prior to the 35th anniversary of my graduation, one of my classmates, Karen Mulholland, and I were asked to be the class contact persons and the liaisons to plan our reunion. As we drafted invitations, encouraging our classmates to come, we would sit and share stories in remembrance of our time as students. Then, we started talking about the scholarships that she and I individually supported through the Foundation. An idea surfaced that we could ask our classmates at the reunion to create a Class of 1979 Scholarship to financially support even more students."

Jane began to mail out letters. "We talked up the scholarship until the reunion. As we were sitting around the table with some of our classmates, we received such a great response from the members of the class of '79 that we were actually about to endow the scholarship. Several years later, we awarded our first Class of 1979 Scholarship."

I would encourage every student to first find the area of nursing that touches your heart – the place where you feel fulfilled, where you feel that you're making a difference in someone's life, and then pursue it with everything you have.



In 2013, the Class of 1979 Scholarship was established. To date, six students have received a total of \$6,000 in scholarship support through the fund. Additionally, the Jane Hartman Whalen Scholarship, established in 2009, has helped alleviate financial burdens for 26 students through \$35,500 in support.

"A piece that I really enjoy about the scholarships is that I don't choose the recipients. I leave that to the faculty. Until very recently, there were faculty members who even knew me when I was a student! They know my love for learning, and they know my passion for excellence. So, they choose students who make me proud. When I am able to meet the students receiving these scholarships, I try and let them know that they have excelled and exceeded, and that's why they were chosen for the scholarships."

Jane was the keynote speaker for the 2022 GSC Scholarship Reception in August. As an alumna and supporter of the College as well as a former TriHealth team member, Jane shared some advice for the next generation of healthcare professionals.

"I would encourage every student to first find the area of nursing that touches your heart – the place where you feel fulfilled, where you feel that you're making a difference in someone's life, and then pursue it with everything you have."

She then added advice for pursuing a lifelong dedication to learning saying, "Earn continuing education hours beyond what the state requires. Go back to school if you can and find that place where you're happy and feel like you're really touching lives and making a difference."
